Staying Safe Online

- Never share personal details or photos online that can identify you.
- Never share your passwords and change them regularly.
- Check your privacy settings on social media sites Be cautious, people can be lying about their age or who they are online.
- Be careful, don't get involved with online scams. Check emails addresses carefully if in doubt double check
- Online abuse and posting or sharing images of someone online without their permission is a criminal offence.
- Never create, share or send sexually explicit messages, images or videos.
- Always report offensive material / messages to the college, site or service provider immediately.

Domestic Abuse-If you are worried about someone keep the lines of communication open

- Anyone can be a victim regardless of sexual identity, age, ethnicity and social status
- Experiencing and witnessing DA can have a serious long lasting impact
- Domestic abuse can involve financial, physical, emotional abuse or controlling behaviour

Safeguarding



Southend Adult Community College is committed to creating and maintaining a safe and positive environment for all members of the College community, including learners, staff, visitors and volunteers. Exploitation



This is when an individual or group uses power or influence to control, coerce or manipulate someone.

This may be through:

- Using things the victim wants or needs.
- · Financial gain and debt.
- Violence or threat of violence.
- Sexual threats, acts or coercion.

Preventing Radicalisation and Extremism

This is when someone actively opposes our values (democracy, liberty rule of law & respect and tolerance for all).

Fact check information – look at a variety of viewpoints and sources. Just because it is on the internet it does not mean that it is true.

Possible signs of radicalisation include:

- Downloading, viewing or sharing extremist materials
- Becoming withdrawn and. focused on one view of the world
- Becoming increasingly unaccepting of other people's opinions.
- A change in appearance and becoming isolated from family and friends.

Wellbeing
